Then, to make sure all his friends knew about the robbery, he posted photos of himself holding some hundred-dollar bills. Of course, the police didn't take long to catch him. When asked about his need to advertise the crime, he told the truth and said to reporters that he couldn't believe his bad luck. He said that he was surprised that the police had looked at his Facebook page!

In Germany, a man was found guilty of **forgery** when he walked into a shop and bought some cigarettes. He paid for the cigarettes with a €30 note, although this note doesn't exist. The shopkeeper didn't notice at first – he told journalists that the **fake** was very poor quality. 'I was distracted. I gave €20 in change to the man. Later I realised my mistake!' In the end, the police had to return the money to Mr Tarrant. If he hadn't gone back to the police station, the police officer would have kept the £75!
